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### II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

—The student will **understand** the various ecclesiastical traditions of the church through a studying of their doctrine and practices.

—The student will **reflect** upon his/her own understanding of theology through the study of doctrinal formulation through the centuries.

—The student will **analyze** the validity of theological perspectives by studying the thought of various historical figures and their movements.

—The student will **synthesize** the historical development of various trends in theology such as the growth of individualism or the emergence of a specific church tradition, practice, polity, or movement.

—The student will **evaluate** the premises, theses, and perspectives of a selection of historical writings.

—The student will **perceive** the value of historical studies for their ministries though we live in an era that denigrates the insights that can be gained from a study of the past.

#### **IV. COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

##### **A. Reading Assignments**

Each student will read the class notes and portions of the course textbooks as listed on the course schedule below in order to gain a general knowledge of the history church to the Modern Era. The completion of these readings will be reported on the final examination. Written Assignments (**papers, journals, study exercises, charts, etc.**) **Due: THURSDAY, DECEMBER 20.**

- B. PAPER.** Each student will write one short paper. The purpose of this exercise is to allow a student to enter into history at a deeper level through understanding, reflection, and writing; it is an exercise in comprehension, critical thinking, and expression.

1. It seems to me that successful people are those who have found something that they are passionate about, a driving delight in their lives; have been given the abilities to execute their passion; and have been granted the circumstances in life that makes it possible for them to see their passion come to fruition. I have met people with passion but not talent; I have met people with passion and talent but not the circumstances. It takes all three and spells a person who makes an impact on their world.

2. Chose a person from the perimeters of our course and answer three questions: (1) What was their passion or what was the driving interest in their lives? What were their God-given abilities that made their passion come to fruition? What circumstances did God allow to bring their passion and giftedness to fruitfulness?
3. This will require some good research and research is expected as well as good literary style. It should be 5-7 pages, double-spaced. Your paper must have a postscript that answers the first two questions of yourself and the third hypothetically for yourself (a paragraph is sufficient).

**4. DUE: Tuesday, November 9**

**C. Quizzes and/or Exams**

**\*\*The Kregel Pictorial Guide** examination will be distributed on **Tuesday, August 28**. The little volume is designed to provide the student, who may be studying church history for the first time, a simplistic overview of the material. The take-home, closed-book examination is due **Tuesday, September 4**.

**\*\*The mid-term examination** will be a take-home and closed book type. It will be distributed on **Tuesday, October 16** and will be due **Tuesday, October 23**.

**\*\*The final examination** will be distributed on **Tuesday, December 11** and will be due on **Thursday, December 20 in the Theological Studies Office before 12:00 noon**. The examination will be a take-home, closed book type.

Note: The function of the examinations is that of a learning tool. Intense study of events, prominent people, movements, and ideas as well as the exercise of writing will hopefully promote comprehension.

I have felt for sometime that I have emphasized reflective thinking to the neglect of a solid foundation of learning (to think you have to know something to think about) so the examination emphasis will shift to determining knowledge of the basics of course content. The course paper will fulfill the need to evidence the ability to think about material. Also, a heightened emphasis will be placed on grading as a learning tool.

Because I am interested in learning more than teaching, I have been thinking about how to increase the learning curve for students. As I get older in life and in the game of classroom expenditure of energy, I find myself becoming concerned that students be more than entertained (excitement is temporal; it is a shadow of eternity yet that is all). Also, I am seeking ways to increase learning without increased burdens of additional work for students who have enough to do to live honorably before the Lord of Heaven under inordinate time restraints. As you know, there are two examinations in this course (a midterm, and a final). These I believe are important, not so much to figure out a grade, but to create an atmosphere of potential learning (given depravity, fear of loss, disappointment, or failure are facts that cause all of us to rise above dereliction [no one operates out of pure motives except the Savior!]). Here is my proposal.

1. I will write a review sheet for the midterm and final examinations and review them with you prior to each examination.
2. I would urge you to take the midterm and the final in groups of three or four, no more. It is a fun thing. One will know what another does not, and you will increase your learning potential. Group participation in taking the midterm and final will net you an additional five (5) points as will group participation in the final. There will be a place on each examine to indicate attendance at the review sessions and for each group member, if you take the examination as a group. If you take the examinations in a small group write one examination; there will be a place on the examine to denote each member. Though each group will write one examination, please return all copies of it.

**VI. COURSE SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION**

This course seeks to understand the emergence and development of the life, ministry, and theology of the church in its historical, cultural, and intellectual contexts. An investigation of the individuals, institutions, and ideas of the Christian enterprise not only informs the other disciplines of a theological education, it interprets the patterns of acting and thinking through which the church has developed.

The study of Church history has several advantages for the servant of the Lord. **First**, it allows us to understand why the church today thinks the way it does, why it uses the language it does. **Second**, it relativizes our own times. It preserves the church from fads and novelty. We have the tendency to perceive new programs and methods with messianic promises of success. History teaches that there are few great events or life changing moments; however, change is very gradual. It is the little things that bring about significant alteration in culture. **Third**, it reminds us that we are part of the body of Christ that is far more extensive than one's private beliefs or denominational heritages. It should deliver us from provincialism, pride, and arrogance borne of the idea that any one church or ecclesiastical tradition stands in the exclusive heritage of first century orthodoxy. **Fourth**, knowledge of the history of the church will preserve the church from error; it provides both polemical and apologetical weapons against deception. The accumulated wisdom of the church can provide an arsenal of arguments as we struggle to preserve the church today from opponents within and without. **Fifth**, acquaintance with the past can give us a sense of calm in turbulent times that the Lord's church will ultimately triumph. The devil has employed every strategy to destroy the church, armies have marched against it, faithless scholarship has relentlessly assaulted it, internal bickering has rent it, and martyrdom has depleted its ranks from time to time. Yet the church marches forward in triumphal anticipation when the kingdoms of this world will be put under Christ's feet and the bride, without spot or wrinkle, will be given to the king.

We will attempt to articulate the interrelationship and interdependence of institutional history and the theological developments of the church. The endeavor to gain insight into the progress and catalytic uses in the formulation of the church's teachings will form a basis to trace out not only **how** doctrine has changed, but more importantly **why** it has developed as it has. Finally, discovering the influences and motivations for individual, ecclesiastical, and doctrinal advancement will enrich our perceptions of the church.
