

SPIRITUAL FORMATION 202: REFLECTIONS ON COMMUNITY SYLLABUS

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course challenges students to pursue new depths of trust out of a common commitment to discovering God's authorship in their lives. *Life Story* is the primary resource used in guiding each Spiritual Formation group toward the development of authentic community.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

A. Cognitive

By the end of this course, the students will:

1. Reflect on the various experiences and relationships in their life,
2. Notice God's presence and activity in their life,
3. Discern particularly formative experiences and relationships in their life story,
4. Identify themes in their life story.

B. Affective

By the end of this course, the students will:

1. Celebrate the unique and faithful way in which God has worked in their life,
2. Value the process of discerning God's unique formative work in our lives,
3. Appreciate the importance of presence, trust and authenticity in relationships,
4. Desire to increasingly respond to God's formative work in their life.

C. Behavioral

By the end of this course, the students will:

1. Honestly engage with and discuss the various *Life Story* topics,
2. Write a thoughtful and creative presentation of their *Life Story*,
3. Authentically share their *Life Story* with their Spiritual Formation group,
4. Empathetically listen to other members share their *Life Story*,
5. Continue to support and encourage others in their SF group.

IV. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

A. Reading assignments (30%)

In addition to the course requirements for SF100-2, students are expected to read Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *Life Together* in order to complete their Reading Response Paper assignment.

Students will submit a **Reading Report** via DTS Online indicating the percentage of reading completed on time by the end of this course.

B. Written assignments (50%)

In addition to the course requirements for SF, the following written assignments are to be completed:

1. **Reading Response Paper (25%)**—Students are expected to write a **4-5 page** paper in response to their reading of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *Life Together*. The paper should include these sections: (1) a summary of the argument of the book, (2) a critical evaluation of the strengths and weaknesses of the book, (3) a discussion of the personal implications of the book for the student's own life and ministry, and (4) a prayer (or hymn of praise) reflecting what the student has learned about God and biblical community. Students will submit their paper via DTS Online as per the Course Lectures and Assignment Schedule (below).
2. **Biblical Study Paper: "One Another" (25%)**—Students are expected to write a **3-4 page** biblical study on several "one another" passages in the New Testament. (See Appendix A in the *Community* curriculum for a list of these passages.) Students will submit their paper via DTS Online as per the Course Lectures and Assignment Schedule (below).

In the paper, the student will: (1) summarize the general message of *three* "one another" commands within their biblical context, (2) share how they have been faithful (or unfaithful) to fulfill such commands within their SF group this semester (being careful to explain any motivations and reasons behind or obstacles to such behavior), (3) identify

ways they can begin cultivating obedience to these commands both now within their SF group and in the future with others, and finally (4) a sample prayer expressing their desire for such transformation.

C. Attendance and Participation (20%)

1. **SF Faculty Meetings**—Students are expected to meet with an SF staff representative at the beginning and end of the course. These meetings will provide an orientation to the course as well as an opportunity for feedback.
2. Attendance at all scheduled events, including large group class sessions (Class Days and Kickoff) and group agreed-upon retreats and outings is expected. All Spiritual Formation groups will determine a group agreed-upon method of communicating absences with their leader. Please see Class Participation and Absences under Course Policies for additional information (below).

Please Note: Students may miss no more than two classes per semester. More than two absences in any particular semester will result in failure to receive credit on your transcript for that semester and failure to progress with your SF group.

D. Cheating and Plagiarism

E. Language and Style

All written assignments should be carefully proof-read and consistently follow Turabian style where appropriate.

All written assignments should strive for gender-inclusive language. As a gospel-shaped, gospel-centered learning community, we have compelling reasons to think, write and speak in a way that is inclusive. Consider using "humans," "persons," "humanity," or "humankind," instead of "man" or "men" when referring to human beings in general. Consider alternating between the use of "he" and "she" as generic pronouns or substituting the use of the plural ("they," "them," or "their") when appropriate.
