BC305HO - COUNSELING AND ETHICS PRACTICUM I SYLLABUS

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Course designed to introduce the practices, processes, and procedures involved in counseling based on the theory and practice taught in BC210 Counseling Theory. Direct interaction in a group counseling atmosphere develops students' understanding of and ability to address common problems that people experience. Students receive 10 one-hour counseling sessions with a supervised licensed professional counselor (LPC) intern per semester (during Practicum I and continuing through the following semester), which results in 20 total counseling sessions for the year. Prerequisite: BC210 Counseling Theory (must be taken previously or concurrent with this practicum). Enrollment limited to twelve students per section. Open also to students who are not in the M.A. in Biblical Counseling program.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

The course is designed in a group discussion format to give students an understanding about their own personality as well as integrate their personal awareness with how the personality of the counselor affects the therapeutic experience. Class discussion and assignments will develop students' skills for providing effective counseling, such as:

1. Developing basic interviewing and assessment skills.
2. Understanding and adjusting to the range of emotions expressed during the counseling sessions.
3. Gaining understanding and appreciation for the counseling process through direct exposure, such as during students' personal counseling sessions.
4. Identifying and working through personal struggles in preparation for serving and counseling others.
5. Developing the interpersonal skills required in effective counseling
6. Understanding and adjusting to emotions during the counseling sessions.

C. Quizzes and/or Exams

Six quizzes throughout the semester with their basis in class sessions and assigned reading. Quizzes will be administered and graded in class at the beginning of the class in which they occur.
