

MLA 8th Edition

Works Cited Quick Reference Guide

- You will list your references at the end of your paper, on a separate page titled Works Cited.
- Your list of citations will be double spaced. Do not put an extra space in between citations. (The examples on this page are not double spaced.)
- Indent a half inch after the first line of the citation. (This is a hanging indent.)
- Alphabetize the Works Cited page by authors' last names. If an author's name is not listed, you will alphabetize by the first word of the title.
- Capitalize all important words in the title.
- If you have two or more works by the same author, order entries alphabetically by title.
- This guide does not cover all the guidelines for creating MLA style citations. For further questions, see mla.org and *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers*, 7th ed.

Parenthetical Documentation

- Use parenthetical documentation to give credit to another person's quotes or ideas that are in the text of your paper.
- At the end of the text you are citing, add parentheses and include the first part your citation, which is usually the author's name, followed by the page number. For example, (Santos 103).
- If you are using two or more works by the same author, include part of the title in the parenthetical documentation. For example, (Fitzgerald, *Paradise* 57).
- If you included the author's name when paraphrasing, you need only include the page number in parentheses. For example: Smith acknowledges this view...(245).
